



CONSTRUCTION IN WASHINGTON STATE



Construction's Tax Contributions

- Construction businesses paid 21% (\$3.5 billion) of all state sales and B&O taxes in 2020.
- Construction businesses paid more than \$3 billion in state sales taxes—26% of the state total—a greater share than manufacturing (2%), services (21%), transportation/information/utilities (4%) and wholesale trade (6%).
- Construction businesses paid almost \$524 million in state B&O taxes—11% of the state's total.
- Construction firms paid more than \$1.2 billion in local sales taxes.

Great Jobs Excellent Wages More Opportunities

- Almost 274,800 people—10% of the private-sector workforce—were employed in construction (including services and suppliers) in 2020.
- Construction-worker pay averages \$63,764 (carpenters average \$65,517; electricians \$73,305; construction supervisors \$104,104; plumbers \$75,036; equipment operator \$72,533; construction laborers \$51,384).
- Total construction payroll in 2020 was almost \$19.4 billion, 9% of total payroll for all industries.
- 61% of Washington's construction firms report difficulty in attracting craft workers.



Construction's Positive Multiplier Effect

- For each \$1 invested in new construction, the state's economy generates an additional \$2.09 in economic activity.
- For each \$1 invested in new construction, earnings increase by 58 cents for *all* households—not just those employed in construction.
